Dear Episcopal Church Women,

Bishop Anne graduated with a <u>Bachelor of Arts</u> from <u>Duke University</u> in 1979. After working as a community organizer for several years following graduation, she earned a <u>Master of Divinity</u> from <u>Pacific School of Religion</u> in 1984. She was ordained deacon in 1987 and priest in 1988, and served as assistant of St Luke's Church in <u>Durham, North Carolina</u> until 1992. She then became the Episcopal chaplain to <u>Duke University</u> until 2005, when she returned to St Luke's Church as rector.

Bishop Anne was elected on January 25, 2013, as Suffragan Bishop of North Carolina. She was consecrated as a bishop on June 15, 2013. [2] From November 1, 2015, until July 15, 2017, she served as Bishop Pro Tempore of the Diocese of North Carolina, due to the resignation of Michael Bruce Curry to become the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. She returned to bishop suffragan upon the consecration of Samuel Sewall Rodman III as 12th Bishop Diocesan of North Carolina. Hodges-Copple is the first female bishop in the Diocese of North Carolina. [3]



United Thank Offerings



The United Thank Offering, (UTO), a ministry begun in 1889 by a few women in the Church, has evolved into a ministry of the Episcopal Church in the United States which has, through the years, made grants to many projects and activities throughout the states and in the Anglican communion.

Funds for the grants and awards are raised by individuals throughout the church who have committed to practicing gratitude day by day for the little things and the big things, making a small donation each time. Twice a year there are "in gatherings" of these offerings, and once a year grants are made by a central UTO Board.

This year the In Gatherings were significantly down, as were the funds raised in 2021. Because most parishes churches did not meet, there was very little activity. In our Diocese, nine churches were able to send in a collection, and they are amazing. Individuals over the diocese also contributed, and their help is greatly appreciated. Many others continued to practice gratitude, without a doubt, and we look to better days to restore our mission. Practicing GRATITUDE blesses the giver and the receiver.

Forty five "Recovering in Love and Gratitude" grants from the 2020 Ingathering were awarded this spring; 19 of which were to the Anglican Communion. No applications were submitted by our Diocese.

To find out more about the grants that were awarded, or to find an application for your project for this year go to episcopalchurch.org/grants/uto, also, unitedthankoffering.org. Your project must fit the theme; Care of Creation-Turning love into action-through justice advocacy, environmental reparations, and development of formation materials. There are guidelines there, and more help is available from UTO staff. The deadline for submitting them to the Diocese uto@ecw-nc.org is late December to allow time for updates and corrections. The deadline for the Diocese is February 4, 2022.





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Recommendations for 2021 Mission Funds Awards

ECW Diocese of North Carolina Missions Report 2021

The Episcopal Church Women, Diocese of North Carolina accepts offerings from churches to support Mission ministries. The generous support of these programs enables us to help demonstrate Jesus' love.



Prevent Child Abuse NC

This is our state chapter of Prevent Child Abuse, America. It is the only statewide organization for the prevention of neglect and child abuse. Programs have been developed to help North Carolina communities prevent mistreatment of children before it occurs: **Advocating for prevention. Building community capacity. Raising awareness.** Prevent Child Abuse NC ensures that prevention is a priority in North Carolina and that all communities have the knowledge, skills, and resources to prevent child abuse and neglect at the local level. They are champions for all children, promoting programs and resources, informed by science, that enable kids, families, and entire communities to thrive-today, tomorrow, and for generations to come." Our funds would be used to create resources that increase factors encouraging children to thrive. Every community in North Carolina is served by the Raleigh office.

2. **The Epiphany Fund** is a designated gift for missions, inside or outside the diocese. For 2021, the Missions Committee proposes an award from this Fund to:

St James Parish in the Diocese of Kitale, Anglican Church of Kenya

Grants to boost small enterprise for St James women in business. A grant of \$100 per woman is enough to mitigate her business. The parish has 130 women who engage in small businesses in the parish. The funds will empower women economically, through their greater involvement in trade, will contribute to addressing inequality and to achieving sustainable economic growth and the Sustainable Development Goals. The amount of the awards for 2021 will depend upon the offerings collected by the end of year 2021. Unfortunately, as of September 7, the donations to both of the above Funds have been rather sparse.

About the Lex Mathews Scholarships for Women

The Diocesan ECW administers and helps fund the Lex Mathews Scholarship program, named for the Rev. Lex Mathews who advocated for women's issues and headed Christian Social Ministries for the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina before his death in 1985.



The scholarships are geared to women of the diocese, age 23 and older, who are seeking either:

- Specialized training in vocational or technical skills
- •A degree or certification *below* the masters or doctorate level
- •Continuing education courses for upgrading job skills

While preference is given to Episcopalians, non-Episcopalians may apply if they are sponsored by a member of an Episcopal church. The amount awarded each year depends upon how the selection committee evaluates each application as well as the financial interest generated by the scholarship fund. Generally, scholarship amounts run between \$500 and \$2,000 for one academic year.

Recommendations for Lex Mathews 2022 Scholarships Procedure

- 1. Mail or, preferably, widely disperse electronic information that describes the upcoming scholarship opportunity and who to contact with questions.
- 2. Mail complete information out as early as possible, preferably no later than September/October for award or distribution of funds for the Spring semester/Spring quarters of following year.
- 3. Include the Offices of Financial Assistance for the North Carolina Community Colleges to the recipients of the original information.
- 4. Determine other avenues for marketing the scholarship to increase the applicant pool.



All applications must be completed in full and received by March 15, no exceptions. Selections are made in April or May and recipients are notified by the end of May so they have time to prepare for the coming school year.

The Durham Convocation meeting was held on July 31st, 2021 at 10am via Zoom.

The meeting was opened with a Welcome from the Durham Convocation chair, Introductions, and an opening Prayer. I gave an update on the planning for the Annual Meeting/and Harris Evans Conference. I advised the group of the current vacancies on The ECW Board: (President, Vice President, Lex Matthews Coordinator) and the need for parishes to send in their pledges for this year.

Mission Report- Mary Scholle

The proposed Mission grants for this year:

The Prevention of Child Abuse America, NC Chapter, is a part of the oldest and largest organization to prevent child abuse and neglect.

ACK St. James Church School- Kenya This is an Entrepreneurial program for women. Studies have shown that when we teach women how to earn incomethe entire community benefits from that income. Mary reported that our giving to Mission programs was one of the best ways to directly help women and children.

UTO - Dorothy Smith

Unfortunately, with the pandemic and church closures around the Diocese; UTO financial giving has decreased. The 2022 UTO grant application is open and available to parishes. The focus of this year's grant is Care of Creation: Turning love into action by caring for God's creation to protect the most vulnerable who will bear the largest burden of pollution and climate change through justice, Advocacy, Environmental reparations, and Development of formation materials. The Deadline is February 4, 2022, for the National office. The Diocese should receive the application by

November 21, 2021.

Happening around the Convocation St. Bartholomew - Pittsboro NC

There was a UTO spring ingathering at St. Bart this year. The ECW meetings are held in person while following the CDC guidelines. Several ladies from the ECW participate in the weekly Commu**nity lunch.** Also, they will begin a new program called the Chuck Wagon which will distribute Cooked Frozen meals to low-income adults in need. **Celebration Hill** is up and running. This is a venue developed by the church for outdoor events and community use of the space and grounds for Prayer or Meditation. There is a slight incline in the landscape and the ECW is Fundraising for a Handrail in the space.

St Philips- Durham

The ECW does not meet in the summer. The next meeting is scheduled September 13, 2021. The group has been on a decline with the loss of several members and there is no expectation for new membership. The group has decided to scale back. The ECW participated in a service project during the pandemic. They also sent written notes to keep in touch. At the next meeting the ladies will vote on where to direct the remaining funds in the current account. The recommendation is to donate the funds to the St. Philips in the Trees ministry. The group participated in the Sandwich

Brigade with Urban Ministries of Durham. Due to social distancing Urban Ministries had to move their residents out and they started the Sandwich Brigade to feed the residents at various locations. The Church is also experiencing change- St. Philips has called a new Minister: The Rev. Maryann Younger. Her first sermon will be held on October 10, 2021.

St. Cyprians-Oxford

The ECW sponsored a Black History program in 2020 that was a "Great Success", there was a community choir and the children performed on the African Drums. This Fall, there will be a celebration of the 275th Anniversary of Gran-

ville County. The children will perform during the event. Also, on 10-2-21 there will be a Cultural Festival in Downtown Oxford.



All are invited to learn about the different cultures represented in the county. Vickie Hammie advised the Group that the ECW president Ms. Helen Othow was recognized during the Black History program as the Outstanding Member of the Community. Ms. Othow has created and supported many Educational and Summer Enrichment programs. The St. Cyprians ECW chapter had an

UTO Spring ingathering. St. Titus' – Durham

In January the ECW presented a Gift Basket to our Priest Stephanie Yancy for her birthday as a show of appreciation and gratitude for her leadership during the Pandemic.

In February, we hosted a Virtual Pancake Supper for Shrove Tuesday. We handed out kits of pancake mix and met online after dinner to share, play games and fellowship.

This summer we had an online Book Club meeting to celebrate our own Syrena Williams who authored her first book "21 Day Spiritual Meditation Journal" Syrena gave a reading from her book and shared about the importance of Daily Meditation and Journaling.

Church Periodical Club was founded in 1888 by Mary Ann Fargo, the wife of a member of the Wells Fargo Express firm. On a trip to the Dakotas with her husband she learned of the great need on the frontiers for Bibles and other spiritual literature. Mrs. Fargo and other church women in New York sent their bundles of books and periodicals westward to missionaries and pioneers via stagecoach. From this beginning a CPC network has spread throughout the American Church.

HOW IT WORKS

Each year, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church USA officially declares the first Sunday of May as CPC Sunday. Special prayers, a sermon on the ministry of the printed word, and a special collection for CPC may be given on this Sunday.

All funding to the CPC is voluntary. Donations are received from (hopefully) each parish in the diocese. As required, half of the contributions are sent to the National CPC office in New York to assist in filling grant requests worldwide. The other contributions are divided at the discretion of the Diocesan ECW's board.


Through the national giving programs, grants are allocated worldwide, based on contributions to two funds.

The National Books Fund (NBF) helps meet religious and secular needs by providing printed and audio-visual materials to individuals, including seminary students, churches and organizations affiliated with the Anglican Communion. Bibles, Prayer Books, books for seminarians, educational materials, medical textbooks, agricultural manuals and books for those in local and global mission are some of the publications the CPC supplies. The need for materials to carry out the mission of the church must be established for all requests. Grant applications are processed after receiving the endorsement of the Episcopal Bishop of the diocese. Grants for the NBF are awarded twice a year.

In addition, through its Mile of Pennies (MOP) program, CPC awards grants to provide for the needs of children aged preschool through high school. MOP fund-raising is geared for Sunday School and youth group projects, but adults are certainly welcome to add their coins to the collection. Requests may be made for books, workbooks, manuals, videos, CDs, Vacation Bible School and audio-

visual materials. One mile of pennies equals \$844.80. MOP grants are awarded up to that amount. Grant applications are endorsed by a CPC representative.

CPC is an affiliated organization of The Episcopal Church. It is the only organization in The Episcopal Church dedicated solely to providing free literature and related materials, both religious and secular, to people all over the world who need and request them who have no other source for obtaining such literature and materials. The CPC operates at all levels of the church — national, provincial, diocesan, parish.

The Sandhills Convocation has not been meeting. However, B. J. Lowry, President of All Saint's Hamlet, and I talk quite frequently. We both sent in UTO contributions from All Saints Hamlet and Calvary Church, Wadesboro.

St. Thomas' in Sanford meets on Friday nights for a session called family night. They publish a newsletter and recently reported:

"Thirty four members of Women of the Church gathered for the first meeting of the 2018-19 year. President Joan Griswold opened the meeting, welcomed all in attendance, and recognized The Rev. Dr. Talmage Bandy and Jessie McKay, guest speakers.

The program centered on a description of the new solar lighting program just introduced in Tanzania by Karimu. Inspiring stories were shared by The Rev. Dr. Bandy and Ms. McKay. Tanzanian homes previously lit by charcoal fires now shine with light. With pig and goat sales, Tanzanian women continue to improve lives for themselves and their families.

Attendees inquired about partnering with Tanzanian Christians. Additionally, it was suggested that liturgical clothing replaced at St. Thomas' be donated to the Tanzanian churches. Mary Lee Dutton made a motion that \$600 be given from WOC funds to purchase additional solar kits. The motion passed.'

Episcopal Church Women-Calvary, Wadesboro



Brought back by popular demand, was the third Celebration of March as Women's Month, highlighting Women of Faith and Courage. Five Sundays in 2021 introduced to the congregation amazing women: Bishop Barbara Harris, the first Episcopal female and women of color in the United States, Bree Newsome, who courageously scaled a 30-foot pole to take down the Confederate battle flag at the South Carolina State House, Deborah from the Book of Judges, The Black Women of the 6888th during WWII, and Sarah, hero of the faith, best described as beautiful, barren and blessed. Other activities include Mother's Day arrangements, Doughnuts for Dads for Father's Day and a May, book study of Bishop Harris and shopping for our new Church.

Christ's Church, Charlotte

The Christ Church ECW Board has met monthly during the pandemic. While several favorite programs had to be cancelled this year, the ECW did provide lunches for Roof Above and is excited to plan service opportunities for the fall. September 8 will be the 1st meeting since 2020. Christ Church awards grants in January from their ECW Mission Funds, they look forward to the Good News Shop opening later this year.

Holy Comforter, Charlotte

The Darrow-Owens Women's Guild involves a range of women from the 30's to 70's. Meeting monthly on the third Monday, speakers and programs are intended for enrichment, education, spiritual development. The Guild best describes the women as the" doers of the word," active in a range of activities of ministries from Loaves & Fishes to Room in the Inn. Darrow-Owens provides a place for active women to "abide in Thanks to all who submitted information! We wel-Christ", accepting each woman at whatever point in life or faith she is. Aside from the Women's Guild, women chair both the Holy Comforter Community Book Studies and the Tuesday Faith Group.

St. Margaret's, Waxhaw

Two women groups exist at St. Margaret's, Episcopal Church Women and The Order of the Daughters of the King. While the Order is a spiritual community where women with similar interest can pray, study, share, affirm and support each other, ECW meets monthly, have an annual spring retreat and aid in various ministries and service projects throughout the calendar year. In 2019, they introduced the concept of Thank you! Circles. Seven Circles were formed with the women signing up according to their interests, and availability. Some met for lunch or dinner, while others had book discussions or went to see a movie. A full ECW meeting is planned in September to appoint a leadership committee, re-organize the Circles and plan for more group gatherings such as making advent wreaths.

Chapel of Christ the King, Charlotte

Situated in the heart of Charlotte between a longestablished neighborhood of modest homes and new, higher- end development, Christ the King is turning their very property into a welcoming bridge between the two, extending an invitation of hospitality to all to come together in community. The women including, Deacon, Rev. Rebecca Yarbrough, are a large part of this transformation. In the most recent edition of the Disciple, a 12-page article best describes an edible landscape transforming the property into a communal gathering space. Projects involving building raised building beds, planting, harvesting, and distributing the crops of their labor is the Holy Spirit at work. A sandwich ministry, under the direction of Deacon Rebecca, is very active to the Roof Above. It will soon include neighborhood involvement of residents for greater support.

St. John's, Charlotte

ECW at St John's continues to be a work in progress. A small few will continue to do their best to stay active. What we know for sure is that younger generations, many at St. John's, are quite involved in a variety of activities that seem to meet their interests and availability.
